

WHY RUSSIAN & EAST EUROPEAN STUDIES?

The Department of Slavic Languages and Literatures offers a wide range of courses in Russian, Polish, and Czech languages, literatures and cultures. Dostoevsky, Tolstoy, Chekhov, Bulgakov: Russia's great writers explore the philosophical, political, and psychological issues that have shaped the modern world. Politics and the humanities go hand in hand in Eastern European culture: Explore politics and history through the film, music, art and popular culture of Poland and the Czech Republic as well as Russia.

Beyond literature, the Department accepts courses in History, Art History, Political Science, Economics, Theater, Film, and Humanities—all of which may be counted towards departmental majors and minors in Russian and East European Studies.

Russia is increasingly a major player in global and US politics; learning Russian can be an asset to your career! Slavic majors have gone on to careers in the State Department, the Department of the Treasury, international relations, law, journalism, medical school, etc.

Students also have been accepted into top programs at Yale, Harvard, University of Michigan, Berkeley, Toronto, University of Virginia, University of London, and other institutions. SEVEN of our students have won Fulbrights to Poland and Russia!

In 2016, a *Wall Street Journal* article noted that among recent graduates, area studies and language studies majors posted the largest salary gains!
